By the numbers

67% - Small business owners that support an increase in *Small Business majority* poll

12.9% - Washingtonians in poverty.

\$19,530 – Poverty line for family of three

\$24,960 – Annual salary working full-time at \$12/hr.

551,000 - Wage earners in WA making \$12 or less

\$17/hr. - If minimum wage had kept up with productivity increases.

\$16.04/hr. – Wage needed by single adult in WA to meet basic needs and save for emergencies

85% - WA minimum wage workers are over age 20

15% - WA teenage minimum wage workers

29% - WA minimum wage working parents

53% - WA minimum wage working women

6,400 – New service industry jobs after \$.55 increase in WA min. wage in 1999

\$3,000,000,000 – Money that could be spent in communities annually with a \$2/hr. wage increase
