Voting & Elections



Just two weeks into the 2014 session, the House approved bills to make major, needed improvements in the elections system and help turn the "one person-one vote" American ideal into a reality. Strong election guidelines and an open government protect and strengthen every American, regardless of political party or background.

Less confusion for voters

Uniform ballot design / HB 1103 - This measure would have required the Secretary of State, in conjunction with the Washington State Association of County Auditors, to develop a uniform ballot format to be used by each county by the year 2022, or upon replacement of vote tallying equipment, whichever occurs first. (Died in Senate)

Moving online voter registration closer to Election Day

Voter registration / <u>HB 1267</u> – Would have changed the time period for online registration from 29 to 11 days before a



primary or election; the time period for in-person registration from 8 to 11 days before a primary or election; and the time period for mail-in registrations from 29 to 28 days before a primary or election. (Died in Senate)

Preregistration for soon-to-be voters

Motor-voter preregistration for 16- and 17-year-olds / <u>HB 1279</u> – This bill would allow 16 and 17 year olds to preregister to vote when they apply for a driver's license or identicard. (<i>Died in Senate)

Equal voting opportunity

The Voting Rights Act / HB 1413 - The Voting Rights Act emphasizes equal voting opportunity where communities of color have historically been disenfranchised. HB 1413 establishes a voting rights act to promote equal voting opportunity in certain political subdivisions by authorizing political subdivisions who already conduct district-based elections, as well as those with at-large election systems, to change their election system if necessary to remedy a potential violation. It prohibits election districts that are drawn or maintained in a manner that denies an equal opportunity for members of a race, color, or language group to elect candidates of their choice or influence the outcome of an election, and establishes a cause of action to redress violations. *(Died in Senate)*
