2024 Session Update

Now that the 2024 Legislative Session has concluded, I am happy to be back home. We ended on time and with balanced supplemental operating, capital, and transportation budgets that reflect our democratic values. I'm proud of what we accomplished together in just sixty days.

We sent close to 400 bills to Governor Inslee with 297 of them passing with strong bipartisan support. This newsletter includes highlights from the session and useful resources.

The Washington House Democrats Members of Color Caucus (MOCC) was founded on the belief that we stand stronger when we stand together. This group prioritizes policy proposals each year that break down structural barriers and reimagine opportunity, access, and representation for people of color in our state. It has been an honor to serve as Chair of the MOCC over the last two years. In this role, I not only have the honor to represent my constituency but individuals, families, and communities of color across the state. I am proud to share two of our priority bills were signed into law this year. HB 1541 which establishes the Nothing About Us Without Us Act and directs the state to bring more people to the table when shaping policy by including folks with lived experience on statutory taskforces, workgroups, or advisory committees. HB 1228 establishes grant programs to create or expand dual language education programs as well as tribal language programs in K-12 schools.

NOTABLE INVESTMENTS: 2024 SUPPLEMENTAL OPERATING BUDGET

\$215 million to combat the fentanyl and opioid crisis, educate our communities, and prevent overdoses; \$150 million for clean energy assistance to low-income households; \$115 million for early learning and high-quality childcare; \$64 million for food assistance for our seniors, children, and local foodbanks, and \$36 million to support immigrants, asylees, refugees and undocumented Washingtonians. Other investments include:

- \$335 million for K-12 Education to support additional school district funding, special education services, paraeducator staffing, and dual credit programs notifications.
- \$245 million to meet statewide behavioral health demand through funding diversion programs, additional inpatient beds, and outpatient care and supportive services. An additional \$215 million will help those who struggle with substance use disorder, plus an increase in access to medication, prevention education and intervention, and support for tribal partners.
- \$335 million in targeted projects to improve air quality (including \$6 million to address health impacts caused by Sea-Tac operations), reduce wildfires, and expand

- renewable energy generation thanks to the Climate Commitment Act.
- \$77 million to ensure long-term care and developmental disabilities programs are operational. Additional efforts to support our communities include property tax relief for eligible seniors, veterans, and people with disabilities (HB 1355); funding a new state facilitated automatic retirement savings account program (SB 6069); cost of living increases for plan 1 retired teachers and state employees (HB 1985); paving the way for co-living housing options (HB 1998); support for foster youth (SB 5908); support for refugees and immigrants (HB 2368); and streamlining the Working Families Tax Credit to promote financial stability (HB 1895).

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INVESTMENTS AT HOME

This biennium I continued to work closely with Sen. Karen Keiser and Rep. Tina Orwall to secure millions of dollars for capital projects in our district, including:

- **\$809,000** for Highline School District Early Learning Facilities
- \$550,000 for the Kent Multicultural Village
- **\$5 million** for Open Doors for Multicultural Families
- **\$500,000** for the Muslim American Youth Foundation Center in Burien
- **\$515,000** for the Refugee Welcoming & Healing Center in SeaTac
- \$100,000 to Electrify the Des Moines Marina
- \$1 million for the Arc Legacy Center
- **\$4.3 million** for Highline College Utility Meters, Facility Repairs, Preservation, and Program Improvements
